chair foreword.

Excitement has been building with the impending transition of the business of the Shepparton Art Museum from the Greater Shepparton City Council to SAM Ltd on 1 July 2020.

This milestone is, from a governance point of view, a rather unique transition of a public art museum from a Council operation to that of a not for profit company. This governance model will be watched by the arts community in Australia with great interest.

The amount of behind the scenes work by Council staff, and in particular the staff of SAM, in working towards the transition date has been an extraordinary effort of energy and passion which is a true hallmark of the Arts sector. The Board of SAM Ltd has similarly been working extremely diligently behind the scenes in preparing for this momentous occasion. The flagship of the Board's governance journey so far is the adoption of a new Strategic Plan which has ambitions not only for SAM, but also for the wider community with the new creative precinct and community hub that will be associated with the relocation of the museum to the new purpose-built building situated on Victoria Park Lake.

The ambition of the new creative precinct will be further enhanced with the relocation of the Greater Shepparton Visitor Centre and the Kaiela Arts Gallery and Studio. The future of SAM is bright and the Board is excited about both the opportunities and the challenges which lay ahead.

director's report.

The 2019/2020 financial year has been unprecedented. First communities across Victoria and NSW grappled with devastating fires, as palls of smoke blanketed much of the east coast. Colleagues in some galleries and museums were forced to close to the public. SAM remained open, but had to cancel a number of its popular education and public program activities.

Since then, we have all dealt with the global COVID-19 pandemic and its impact on the arts and cultural sector, and our community more broadly. SAM's commitment through the yo-yo openings and closings was to stay connected to our community. We tried to remind Shepparton and our wider audience of the little things that get us up in the morning, that we value, and that remind us of who we are and what we love.

Like many, we 'pivoted', and took the museum online. We set up the #SAMHub to maintain our commitments to our artists, create new opportunities, and develop digital experiences and programs to engage and connect our community. Thank you to all those who reached out and said what a difference these programs, virtual tours, activities, and dives into the collection made. As I write this, the museum remains closed in line with government restrictions.

The SAM team has achieved a lot over this last 12 months, notwithstanding fires and global pandemics.

Our exhibitions are developed to enhance and extend our understanding of SAM's collection strengths: ceramics and Indigenous art. One highlight was being the sole Victorian venue for the highly popular Arthur Boyd, Landscape of the Soul. Alongside this Bundanon Trust touring exhibition, we presented an exhibition drawn from SAM's' collection showcasing ceramics by the extended Boyd family. Collector/ Collected was an exhibition in three parts: a major collection of ceramics collected by artist John Nixon, partnering with Deakin University Gallery; a selection of studio pottery from the '60s and '70s from SAM's collection; and responses from four contemporary artist to ideas of collecting. We also partnered with Joels Auctions to present a highly successful Collectors' Roadshow in Shepparton. Two of our SAM curated exhibitions, Raquel Ormella and Craftivism, continued to tour nationally in partnership with our partners NETS Victoria.

SAM's activities were designed to deepen engagement with our Aboriginal community and the rich and diverse multi-cultural community in Shepparton. We continued to progress SAM's inaugural Aboriginal

Engagement Plan, with support from Creative Victoria. This work will underpin SAM's engagement at all levels of the organisation, working with our local Aboriginal community, the Yorta Yorta people and Elders, and Indigenous and Torres Strait Islander people from across Australia and First Nations peoples more broadly. A series of Campfire yarns, held in conjunction with Kaiela Arts artists and staff, and developed by Spacecraft Design, contributed to the design of fabric for the new Museum's furniture.

Understanding and engaging audiences remain core to the SAM experience. Although many of our education and public program activities had to transition online, we continued to offer a range of artist-led programs designed to engage students and families, including the 2020 EduLab presented by Nadia Hernandez and supported by La Trobe University.

The Collection has continued to grow over this period, largely through generous donations and gifts to the collection. Carrillo and Ziyin Gantner's support of the Collection, through the ongoing donation of their major indigenous collection, enables us to continue to showcase the work of indigenous artists from our region and South East Australia in a wider Indigenous Australian context. A number of people have given very generously this year, and we particularly thank the Robert Salzer Foundation, managed by the Public Galleries Association Victoria (PGAV) for their matched support for contemporary acquisitions.

A number of organisations have supported our activities over this last year, including SAM's Engagement Partner, the University of Melbourne; La Trobe University; the Buckland Foundation, supporting our engagement work; the Robert Salzer Foundation; and our partners NETS Victoria. The SAM Friends have continued to support SAM's acquisitions for future generations; and the SAM Foundation have continued to raise funds that are a major financial contribution towards the Capital campaign and building the new SAM.

This financial year marks the end of one chapter, and the start of another, as SAM transitioned from being owned and operated by Council, to standing independently with its own Board as a not for profit company limited by guarantee. Council's vision is that this change creates an exciting opportunity for arts and culture to make Greater Shepparton an even more dynamic and exciting place to live and work. The new SAM Limited Board have operated in parallel with Council for the last 6 months so that SAM maintains momentum. I commend and thank the SAM team who have not only kept the museum operating in these challenging times, but also worked towards our transition and exciting next stage.

We are continuing to plan and prepare for our move in early 2021 to the new Shepparton Art Museum, a stand alone building designed by leading Australian architects Denton Corker Marshall. Co-located alongside Kaiela Arts, Shepparton's Indigenous community art space and workshop, the Visitor Centre, and a café and commercial opportunities, SAM's new space will be a place for community to gather, and to attract visitors from near and far, a new magnet for Shepparton.

It has been very heartening to see the new SAM building continue to grow throughout this unprecedented year of lock-downs and closures. SAM plans for activities and exhibitions in the new building are being designed to deepen our understanding of place, context, people and our collection. It's rejuvenating to play an active role in planning for Shepparton's renewal as we move into a COVID-normal world, and we look forward to SAM being a catalyst for audiences to regenerate in 2020-21.

Recent acquisitions are listed within the Collections section of this report. The significant increase in donations is the result of the increasing profile of the art museum and the committee is proud of its many achievements. I extend my thanks to the donors who have gifted work to the museum and to the Friends of SAM, who continuously support acquisitions through their raised funds - their generosity is greatly appreciated. I also acknowledge the donations made by Carrillo and Ziyin Gantner which will form the inaugural pieces of the SAM Limited collection.

With SAM Limited taking over the operation of the Shepparton Art Museum, a new SAM Limited Artistic & Acquisitions Committee has been established to advise both the Greater Shepparton City Council and SAM Limited on acquisitions and other artistic matters.

friends of sam. report.

As for all organisations, Friends of SAM's plans for 2020 were curtailed but a busy and varied first eight months are indicative of the benefits of belonging to Friends of SAM and participating in the community through the arts.

One highlight, after several months of preparation, was our Gala Dinner with the Boyds and Friends held in October, alongside the immensely popular Boyd exhibitions at SAM. Ticket sales, and generous support by local artists and businesses for an auction raised over \$16,000 which enabled the Committee to present a further \$15,000.00 to SAM Foundation on behalf of all members. Tours of the exhibitions added to the occasion, giving us a taste of the future at new SAM when we can offer social occasions alongside the exciting exhibitions.

The annual Best of Friends exhibition was another highlight, and significant for several reasons. Fifty-five artists presented almost ninety works which were enjoyed by the large crowd at the opening of SAM Local which was scheduled to be the last temporary exhibition at current SAM. We planned a 'moving on' celebration timed with the closure of those exhibitions, but it was not to be because of pandemic restrictions. Despite the early closure, Best of Friends was hailed as a great success, celebrating the diverse artistic and creative talents of our community.

Coffee mornings continue to grow in popularity as a regular feature of the Friends calendar. Groups have learned more about several exhibitions at SAM, enjoying floor talks presented by SAM staff; visited sites along the Goulburn River that inspired Sidney Nolan; toured the Shepparton Courthouse and exhibitions by local artists and groups such as Shepparton Textile Artists.

Members of Friends continue to use opportunities to participate at SAM in various ways. A small group of Friends had fun working on panels for the murals that decorate the construction fence at SAM. Another group met throughout the year to prepare for assisting at SAM as voluntary guides, and now look forward to learning more and to sharing with visitors to new SAM.

sam. foundation report.

It is my pleasure to again offer this report on behalf of the SAM Foundation. The SAMF Board currently consists of myself as Chair, Sandy Clark and Carrillo Gantner AC as Deputy Co-Chairs, Andrew Fairley AM, Jo-Anne Foster, Adam Furphy, Meryl Hill, Clare Pullar and Polly Symons as Directors with John Evans continuing as Company Secretary. This past year, we farewelled long-time Director, Drew Pettifer, taking comfort that Drew joined the SAM Ltd Board at that time. Director of Development, Sheila Colwell and Administrative Assistant, Kylie McCarrey, also continue to support and quide us.

In mid-October 2019, SAMF Board enjoyed mingling with the Directors of SAM Ltd following our regular meeting and Annual AGM. It was an important opportunity to meet and learn about each other, as we will be working closely together to make SAM a major regional cultural destination into the future.

Despite the unprecedented (and serious) challenges facing us all in the past six months, the Foundation's fundraising campaign has carried on steadily. We have been unable to hold events or make announcements, but nonetheless we have sought new gifts and pledges from the Shepparton community. Now, I am happy to share that the Campaign for the new SAM stands at \$7.6 million in pledges and gifts with over \$6.2 million of that total committed to the new building project.

This has not been an easy time for arts fundraising. Due to the horror of January's bushfires and the shock of the COVID-19 crisis, some charitable individuals and organisations have chosen to reset their philanthropic priorities to align with urgent needs. Fortunately, we have not had a current donor alter or withdraw their pledge, demonstrating the real commitment our donors have to the importance of the new SAM project.

I am happy to announce that local support continues to grow. Shepparton families, companies and industries have pledged and donated to the Campaign. The Peter & Maria Copulos Foundation and the Furphy Family have each made generous pledges to the building. In the coming year, we anticipate sharing the donor list more publicly as well as the details of how SAM donors will receive recognition in the new building. As the Campaign progresses steadily, Shepparton once again demonstrates that even in difficult times, this community continues to pull together for the arts and for the benefit of the region.

A Finer Grain: Selected Works from the SAM Collection

18 May 2019 to 25 October 2020

This exhibition presents key and lesser-known works by Australian women artists from the Shepparton Art Museum collection.

Spanning the full breadth of SAM's 83 year collection history, the exhibition takes a chronological approach, loosely grouped by decade from the date of creation. Artworks span a range of medium and subject, and showcase the significance of SAM's material focus in works on paper, painting, and Australian ceramics. This approach offers insights into SAM's collection and the history of its development, as pertinent then as it is today.

In response to museum closures in line with Government guidelines, SAM developed an online virtual tour of this exhibition. This virtual tour included audio commentary from 4 artists who explored chosen pieces from the exhibition; David Sequeira, Angela Valamanesh, Damon Moon and Sally Smart.

Arthur Boyd: Landscape of the Soul

14 September to 24 November 2019

A Bundanon Trust touring exhibition, Arthur Boyd: Landscape of the Soul featured 40 paintings and 20 works on paper, including a group of masterpieces borrowed from major state art museums. The exhibition also included letters, photographs and sketchbooks spanning almost half a century and featuring works from Boyd's adolescence through to his final years.

The three-year national touring exhibition curated by Barry Pearce, Emeritus Curator of Australian Art AGNSW, explored Arthur Boyd's lifetime of landscape paintings.

Collector/Collected

7 December 2019 to 1 March 2020

A maximalist exhibition exploring the art of collecting, *Collector/Collected* was an exhibition in three parts. It showcased two major collections of Australian studio pottery from the 1960s and 70s: The *Studio Pottery from the John Nixon Collection* and SAM's own collection from this period.

Alongside these significant collections, four contemporary artists' responses were presented, all exploring aspects of collections and why we collect: Tony Albert, Kate Daw, Geoff Newton and David Sequeira.

A Collector's Roadshow was held as a celebration towards the end of the exhibition, with locals encouraged to bring pieces from their own collections to be appraised by experts from Leonard Joel, Melbourne. Every available session was pre-booked, and the day saw a wide variety of treasures uncovered, with a few valuable surprises as well.

Studio Pottery from the John Nixon Collection was conceived and presented at Deakin University by curator James Lynch in 2018.

SAM Local: Spotlight / Best of Friends / eduLAB.

13 March to 21 June 2020

SAM Local: Spotlight was an exciting, profile raising opportunity for a local artist to develop and exhibit a body of work at SAM. Madeline Wright's solo exhibition of object based works in metal, ceramic and glass was based on her upbringing near the Goulburn River in Arcadia. Inspired by the objects and colours of this landscape, A Field Guide to Utopia encouraged the viewer to slow down and observe nuances in our surroundings.

SAM Local: Best of Friends was an open access exhibition, designed to provide insight into the creative practice of many artists working across a range of media in the Goulburn Valley. Artworks were available for sale, to encourage support of our creative community.

Exhibition attendance was impacted by COVID-19 restrictions, and therefore a video tour of SAM Local exhibitions was created, to allow visitors to enjoy these exhibitions from home. A listing page of every Best of Friends work was added online, to enable sales of works to continue, supporting our artistic community at a time of great uncertainty.

SAM Local: eduLAB was created to enable a diverse range of students and teachers the opportunity to work directly with an artist to create an immersive installation at SAM. EduLAB artist Nadia Hernández's work is informed by the current political climate of her home country and her experience as a migrant woman living abroad. Articulated through textiles, paper constructions, painting, music, installations, sculptures and murals, Nadia designed a series of workshops for school groups of all ages to explore their inner sense of strength and personal connections to place.

Unfortunately, community interactions in the gallery were impacted by COVID-19 guidelines, and as such, only one school group was able to enjoy these workshops in the museum. Nadia was able to revise her guided workshops and recorded two 15min workshops for kids of all ages to engage with from home. These online materials were distributed to our education groups as well as our general SAM community, to encourage all to engage with her work.



SAM eduLAB: Nadia Hernandez

Designed as an immersive and continually evolving exhibition, where students, teachers and community collectively transformed a SAM exhibition space through sculpture, art, paper construction and painting, Nadia Hernandez' eduLAB explored participants feelings of strength, home and connection. Due to COVID-19 restrictions around in-person interactions, these workshops were delivered online.

SAM Scholars

- Term 4 Contemporary Creative careers and practice with Lauren Cassar of label Mirador.
- Planned sessions with Nadia Hernandez were unable to go ahead as planned due to COVID restrictions.

Teacher Professional Development Series

- Term 4 Contemporary Fashion Design Practice and Art Therapy for the classroom with Lauren Cassar of label Mirador. Two sessions.
- Contemporary Art on the Road. Developed in collaboration with Gertrude Contemporary, Monash University Museum of Art and the Victorian Curriculum Assessment Authority, this professional development series for teachers delivers an ongoing program committed to a sustained engagement with contemporary art practice and process. Deferred due to bushfires across Victoria and NSW.

SAM & ASHE Residency Project

A SAM residency program designed in collaboration with the Academy of Sport Health and Education (ASHE) which offers hands-on based workshops and museum literacy experience for the students of ASHE. In late 2019, community groups including ASHE worked with artist Trent Walter in the creation of print works for his travelling exhibition.

engagement – public programs.

SAM's Public Programs reach a multitude of diverse audiences with its programs and events based in the Greater Shepparton Region. This year we were forced to shift the way we deliver these programs due to bushfires and the COVID-19 global pandemic.

Changing to online content, we were able to increase our audiences, and engage through a range of targeted online exhibitions, workshops, and activities. SAM's programs are designed to be low cost and free. We engaged 6,982 people through programs, presenting 131 events hosted both at SAM and virtually.

We offered a diverse program of participatory activities, workshops, artist and curator-led floor talks, online tutorials and downloadable templates. These activities invited audiences to discover unique ways of engaging with our exhibitions, even after the museum's physical doors had closed.

Exhibition Programs

Highlights included:

- SMFACA artist Julie Bartholomew immersed participants in the tactile form of clay in a workshop focusing on sculptural techniques in ceramics
- Stephen Benwell, Lisa Slade and Dr. Rebecca Coates spoke on the role of art prizes and the role of ceramics in a contemporary climate
- In Autumn, local artists shared their expertise in plein air painting, which developed into a series of painting workshops in the spirit of Arthur Boyd's landscapes
- The highly popular talk and tour led by Bundanon Trust staff, who shared vivid stories and knowledge of Arthur Boyd's home and studio
- Crowds gathered for the Collectors
 Roadshow in February, a partnership with
 Leonard Joel's Auctions, who appraised and
 shared insights on artworks often forgotten in
 the back cupboard
- James Lynch and Sarah Wall discussed the styles and methods of collecting and its links to a society brimmed full of consumption
- Ceramicists Tantri Mustika and Kaye Poulton who explored appropriation and reinterpretation of artworks in their popular practical ceramics workshops.



SAM Talks

Highlights included:

- Hayley Millar-Baker artist talk about SAM's new acquisition, A Series of Unwarranted Events, which portray stories of the Gunditjmara people as a part of this year's NAIDOC week
- Author Don Edgar in conversation with Dr. Rebecca Coates on the rich histories and current challenges facing rural galleries.

Online Workshops

SAM's Public Programs has this year adapted to the growing need for online workshops and exhibition engaging materials accessible remotely. These programs were featured on a dedicated #SAMHub site and included:

- Weekly pre-recorded workshops for toddlers and primary school-aged children, that showcased a fun new activity using household items
- Online workshops also included a six-week artist spotlight through April-June for adults. Zhu Ohmu, Kaye Poulton, Tantri Mustika and Kristen Retallick shared their expertise in ceramics and painting with over 600 people combined following along from home, and new audiences from overseas.

For Kids

SAM Little Hands – a sold-out suite of workshops offering a monthly sensory play workshop for toddlers that encourages visual learning through play. SAM's Art Club, this year run by visual arts teacher Rowena Booth.

SAM's Autumn and Summer School Holiday

Programs - designed to ignite creativity in young budding artists. Autumn saw illustrator Miranda Sofroniou draw the bush landscapes at Kidstown with both young and old joining in. Artist Madeline Kidd joined us in the summer for an elaborate children's party, featuring decoration, cake making and costumes. Our popular messy play activities and ongoing partnership with Aquamoves continued to progress as a sold-out success.

Outreach Program

SAMs' engagement strategy sees Public Programs often reaching beyond the museum's walls to invite those who may not be regular visitors. We have hosted events and workshops at Kidstown, Aquamoves and the Shepparton Lake. Other engagement events included participation at the Land of Plenty Festival, the Out in the Open Pride Festival and the Fryers Street Food Festival.

New SAM Mural Project

With excitement for the new building brewing and construction well underway, the community embarked on an ambitious mural painting project to brighten up the new building site. Over 9 staff-led full-day workshops, 50 people completed 12 large scale murals that were displayed at the new SAM building site. Participants of all ages and from diverse backgrounds came together to paint a bright and hopeful visual for what the new building represented and the opportunities it presents to them and the broader community.

The Friends of SAM fundraise to provide crucial support for the acquisition of artworks for the SAM Collection. Thanks are extended to the Friends of SAM President Ann Fagan, the Committee, and all those who contributed, attended events, or assisted with fundraising. We also acknowledge and thank all the members for their ongoing support of Friends and SAM.

The involvement of SAM's volunteers continues to be an important part of SAM's role in engaging and being supported by members of Greater Shepparton's community who contribute in a variety of ways including visitor services support, cataloguing, guiding, and public programs. Friends of SAM are currently developing a training program for Volunteer Guides and this will be implemented into the SAM operational structure in the coming year.

The Gallery Shop provides SAM with a commercial source of income to support operations, but also offers visitors a place to purchase artist-made ceramics and gifts. With works from local and interstate artists the shop represents a number of artists including Kaye Poulton, Erin Lightfoot, Sandra Bowkett and Tiff Manuell. Throughout the year, the shop stocks a range of supporting products for our exhibitions program. All SAM publications are available for purchase and specific exhibition related products are developed.

Dissident Objects and Subversive Forms presents the work of 18 contemporary Australian artists who utilise craft based materialities with a political intent. The Moon 15 June 2019 – 1 September 2019 Curated by Lisa Sullivan

20 July 2019 marked the 50th anniversary of the first Moon landing and the first steps taken on the lunar surface by Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin. This exhibition was programmed to coincide with this significant milestone and brought together artistic responses to the celestial body that orbits the Earth. For centuries artists from many cultures have been inspired by the Moon, the most prominent feature of our night sky. The exhibition included historical works created when the Moon could only be viewed from afar, works from the era of the 1960s space race, and more contemporary responses informed by the imagery and scientific knowledge acquired through space exploration.

After years of planning, the construction of the new Shepparton Art Museum at Victoria Park Lake finally began in April 2019 with Deputy Prime Minister Michael McCormack and Federal Member for Murray Damian Drum visiting the site. The building has progressed well despite COVID-19 restrictions and is expected to be completed in late 2020.

Designed by internationally renowned architects Denton Corker Marshall, the new SAM will be a five-storey building housing the Shepparton Art Museum, the Visitor Centre, and Kaiela Arts, Shepparton's Indigenous community art studio and gallery. The 5,300m² building will also house a café, event space and a roof top viewing deck, with new public spaces including the Art Hill and Ampitheatre.
